Gastrointestinal and Liver Diseases Important to the Chinese American

Chinese Americans constitute a large and growing population in the United States, especially where we live in Southern California. Present public health guidelines and media reports on health subjects focus primarily on diseases common to all Americans and therefore tend to ignore diseases that may be more important to certain ethnic/racial groups. While Gastrointestinal (GI) and Liver diseases are common in the general population, the GI/Liver diseases that tend to afflict Chinese Americans are different. This talk will focus on GI and Liver diseases that are more important to the Chinese American.
